# Interview with Pastor Somchai Chuenjit, Chairman of the EIS Board of Directors

### Please introduce yourself to the EIS family.

# 50th Anniversary Celebration

uring this grand celebration of the EIS golden anniversary, the Ekamai International School family humbly praises and thanks God for His continued guidance, mercies and blessings to EIS through all the years of its educational service and operation.

### **Brief History**

It was in 1957 when Child Training Center (CTC) under its founder and administrator, Mrs. Alma Marie Milne, opened its doors in Ekamai.

Because the garage of Dr. Waddell in Mission Hospital Bangkok could no longer accommodate the increasing enrolment of Miss Esther Feltus's class that began in 1946, the School Board approved the new location which was a paddy field in Ekamai 63.

### **Child Training Center (CTC)**

Child Training Center became Christian Training Center, and between the mid-60's and early 70's it carried the name Adventist Special Time and Vocational School (ASVS), with Mr. John Falconbridge as its administrator, Mr. Kamol Tan, manager and treasurer, and Mr. Banjong Thonasud, Thai principal.

### **Adventist English School (AES)**

Later it became Adventist English School (AES) until 1992 when Pastor Arthur Bell was administrator and Mr. Somchote Chulkasate, Thai principal. During this time, Mr. Kamol Tan brought to the administration's awareness the need to apply for international status.

Pastor Bell laid the ground work, and then Pastor Stanley Baldwin did the follow up and applied for external accreditation with Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) in Burlingame, California, USA.

Mr. Somehote applied for a new school name, Ekamai International School.

These administrators' work paid off in 1993 when AES was given a 5-year candidacy status by WASC.

Mrs. Perla Camagay, assistant principal, led out in the accreditation process with full support from the school director Mr. Ronald Anderson, the administration, faculty and staff.

### **Ekamai International School (EIS)**

In June 1998, the school received its WASC accreditation in addition to the internal accreditation from the Adventist Accreditation Association (AAA).

Having been accredited by AAA and WASC, EIS was granted the international school license by the Thai Ministry of Education (MOE).

This opened the opportunities for EIS graduates to study abroad and in the local universities without having to take the government exams.

This is the history of God's work in the growth and development of EIS, and since then He has continued to guide and direct.

The Sabbath School program featured Chaplain Howard Vandermark's Power-Point presentation of God's leading throughout the history of EIS, portraying a collection of its administrators since 1957.

# **AP Program**

ach year thousands of high school students around the globe participate in the AP (Advanced Placement) program. Operated by the College Board in the United States, the AP program is designed for students to take university-level courses and exams to earn university credit while in high school.

The AP program is recognized worldwide as a leader in university preparation. Currently over 90 percent of four year universities in the United States grant credit or placement for qualifying exam grades. In addition, over 600 universities in over 45 countries also grant credit or placement to students who perform successfully.

EIS has been offering AP courses and exams for over 4 years. Courses currently offered include Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Calculus, and Economics, and we are looking to expand the program to include more social sciences and language courses.

Many of our students have performed well on the AP exams, and have gone on to earn university credit. We look to continue that trend this year when our AP students sit for their exams in May.

# **High School Science Fair**

In 2001, teachers from the Intermediate Section organized our first science fair. Highly popular, this event was repeated in 2003 and 2007. On February 19-20, 2008, the high school teachers staged their own program. This latest fair began with the cutting of a ribbon, a short talk by Director David Gouge, and the introduction of judges.

Soon, large numbers of students, parents and teachers from K - 12 were visiting the 70 projects on display in the Milne Auditorium. Although everyone taking a science class was encouraged to participate, the majority of the contributors were from the Physical Science and Biology I classes. Students from Health, Chemistry and Biology II classes, however, did create experimental exhibits, posters and dioramas.

Participants were judged on how well their display demonstrated some application of the scientific method. Also, projects were supposed to be practical, simple, original, and potentially beneficial to the society and environment. The top three research projects were entitled, "The Pulley System," "Soap from Lard," and "Acupressure versus Aspirin."

Since the students worked on their projects over two terms, they needed to manage their time effectively. Most proved resourceful and found creative ways to demonstrate how repetitive and often boring experimentation could result in glittering new inventions.
