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

# INTEGRATED ENRICHMENT IEL OFF-CAMPUS DAY

bout 36 IEL students along with 7 teachers and staff trod the two acre plot of Baan Bang Khen last April 27, 2018. This trip was called "Integrated Enrichment Off-Campus Day" for the reason that the place had enriched and reinforced the students' previous knowledge in relation to health, values, history, and grammar while having fun. Baan Bang Khen became the one-day classroom of the IEL students with worksheet questionnaires especially designed to fit the different subjects taught in the classroom.

Baan Bang Khen, as it is called, is a nostalgic cluster of museums. It consists of a number of museums in specially constructed old houses with each house exhibiting displays that preserve an aspect of everyday life more than half a century ago.

Opened in January 2017, this project is the brainchild of restaurant owner, Sompong Pisankitvanich, who decided to convert this 5 rai (0.8 hectare or 2 acres) plot of land into an indoor and outdoor vintage display area.

Upon reaching their destination, many students became emotional when entering the Baan Por Luang area where old photographs, coins, bills and other memorabilia were displayed in honor and in commemoration of the late Rama IX - King Bhumibol Adulyadej. He was so dear to the Thai hearts that Yanaphat Wangarrayagul (IEL 2) couldn't help but whispered: "I am having goosebumps, Teacher." I even overheard some students whispering and saying that they felt like crying. Most of the students took the time to pay respect to the king with a traditional Thai wai.

The mood switched when the groups entered the Coca-Cola house. On display were limited edition Coke bottles, mugs, jars, postal boxes, clocks, dolls, signage, refrigerator magnets, pins, vending machines, as well as benches from different parts of the world. Even if some of the students and teachers were not Coke lovers, they were fascinated and enjoyed the displays.



Another highlight of the place was the variety of shops ranging from vintage clocks, telephones, amplifiers, radios, televisions, barbershops, traditional Chinese medicine, and home, beauty, hygiene, and health products such as matches, baby powders, milk, detergent soaps, as well as toothpaste and much more. We were even surprised to see the toothpaste Darkie with a dark man on the picture, only to find out that the Darlie toothpaste of today was once called Darkie.

As part of the tasks led by the student leaders, the students positioned themselves, sang songs, and recited memory verses in the antique classroom.





They were happy to see how a typical classroom (fit with chairs, desks and school supplies) looked like in the past. The teachers and staff had fun watching the students act as teachers and students while posing for pictures. It was a hot day, but there was more to discover! The students made their way up to the tree houses using the wooden stairs. Each house was built around a big tree trunk. The students comfortably walked from one house to the other, occasionally looking down from above. Most of them did not want to leave as they said in chorus: "It's so cool to be up here!" To quench the thirst and for a cool treat in the heat everyone rushed into the café to be greeted by air conditioning. However, the students were surprised to see the huge teddy bear dolls and statues of selected famous singers and movie characters such as The Incredible Hulk and Elvis Presley. The entrance fee was just twenty baht, and the entrance tickets could be exchanged with a bottle of water or other items at the café. The queue was a bit long in the café, so while waiting for the students roamed around, and were delighted to touch and take photos of the vintage scooters, projectors, bicycles, motorcycles, refrigerators, helmets, and even gasoline stations.

The IEL students continued to wander and appreciate even the very old-fashioned murals on the walls. IEL 2 student, Suvitchaya Veerachit, who also suggested this place could not contain her emotion, expressed: "I want to come back!"



rowing up in an urban environment, one can imagine what children are missing out on. Enjoying a trip to the rural areas and seeing real, live farm animals is rare these days. This EIS field trip was another activity that the Kindergarten students were looking forward to participating in. On February 28, 2018, the Kindergarten 2 and Kindergarten 3 classes decided to visit the Mini Murrah Farm, an hour and a half drive from Bangkok. The participants included 127 Kindergarten students, 10 teachers and parents who helped supervised the trip.

The objective of this field trip was to identify the farm animals, to develop the sensory learning through objects like dry hay, green grass, and vegetables, and to increase their appreciation of nature. Everyone was welcomed with fresh organic Murrah milk and farm-made cookies.

Then after the welcome, the walking tour started. The students experienced farm life, and learned how it was like to raise Murrah Buffalo with the help of a farm expert. Feeding a baby Murrah was exciting to many of the students, but to some it was scary as it was also their first time to feed a baby Murrah. In addition, the Kindergarten 2 and Kindergarten 3 enrolled in a cooking course and one of the highlights was the DIY pizza activity. Another one was the ice cream workshop where the students transformed fresh Murrah milk into fresh farm made ice cream to take home.











Knowing where our food comes from, and getting involved in more outdoor activities provides the students with an experience to see how a farm works and how animals help us. The trip has been a great hands-on experience that no kindergarten book can provide.



This learning initiative from the Kindergarten section is consistent with Ekamai International School's continuing desire and goal to equip its student body with a holistic Christian Adventist education.

he EIS Chess Club organized the 1st EIS FIDE-rated Tournament on Sunday, March 18, 2018. The tournament was the first of its kind to be organized by the club as a means of exposing chess to students, as well as to gain traction within the Thailand chess community. The tournament consisted of six rounds, 25 minutes each, for both the open and student categories with a total cash prize of 15,000 baht. Participants in the open category were also eligible to get their points tallied up to contribute to their official FIDE score which would affect their rankings internationally. The tournament was the largest chess competition that EIS has ever hosted, bringing in a total of 85 chess players: 38 players were placed in the open category and 47 in the student category.

Since the tournament allowed for tallying of official FIDE scores, the competition was fierce. EIS witnessed the participation of some very high rank players, including International Master Kjetil Stokke, who was the Thailand National Trainer Asian Indoor Game 2017, as well as FIDE Masters Jony Habla and Yaaqoz Vaingorten. The tournament had some high level plays that were watched by spectators and players alike. After the day spent playing six contested rounds of chess, the winners who tallied the highest scores for the student category were Jirath Samatthanan in first place, Kinh Luan Nguyen in second place, and Kunthee Yongvanich in third place. For the open category, we had Gerald Ferriol in first place, Winston Joseph R. Silva in second place, and FIDE Master Jony Habla in third place.


Cash awards and certificates awaited the participants.


As the curtains closed, applause exploded and the crowd joyously beamed, amused by the comical play, which ended with a terrible twist and left most flustered. The End.

n front of a house in a quiet neighborhood lies an abandoned 1980 Toyota Corona rusting away the last remaining years of its life. Then one one day, a group of young aspiring engineers take the vehicle into their care and return it to its former glory over four months.

The Engineer's Society, led by seniors Theerapat Santanaprasit 12G, and Sirawich Limpiwilart 12A, have been working on the aged Toyota Corona diligently since the beginning of 2018 and have managed to make the once nonfunctional car into a drivable one. However this feat would not have been possible without the main team of the club: Chanakarn Komthongvijit, 9D, Jason Nills Jirapaht Jittaseno, 9D, Noppawat Yacantha, 8A and the sponsors namely: Amara Joan Sims, Sonny Ronquillo, Jun Earl Dagaojes, and Dem Gagatam. Many days were spent under the blistering hot sun and evenings

tinkering around with engine parts. The initial process of the project involved fixing and rebuilding the clutch, which is a plate that sends power to the wheels, as well as rebuilding the carburetor, a device that mixes fuel with air. The interior of the car was stripped in order to save weight.

After that, the engineers took the car to a body shop located on the outskirts of Bangkok to learn and experience welding. "We learned that welding metal is very time consuming if you are inexperienced. Many mistakes will be made in the early days, but after some practice, it becomes fun and easy," said Theerapat. The team cut and welded metal parts for the rusted sections of the car and modified the frame in order to improve handling and safety. The engine was further repaired and the students moved on to painting the car.











Recently the former "piece of scrap metal" has become a fully functional car that can be driven with little to no problems. The Engineer's Society plans to perform an engine swap, add a roll cage, and retune the Corona's suspension in the future.

With the seniors graduating, the car project has been passed on to the next generation of engineers.

More than 300 people were to help our assigned community in the health check-up. It was an expression of joy and heart work as the teachers and students worked and served side-by-side to meet the physical health needs of the local residents. Students were able to experience a beautiful moment helping children and seniors alike.

Students went door to door, person to person, handing out flyers about Jesus Christ as those who speaks Thai helped in translating and ensuring that the right message is conveyed.

At the same time they informed people about the health exposition so that they could go in case they were not aware of it. For families with children, they were told about the children's activity in the afternoon, which included: coloring, singing, and teaching English songs with actions to make it more enjoyable.

This event lasted the entire day and students were helping out with different parts of the service, whether it was playing with the kids, conversing with them, or finding others to join in the activities. Towards the end, we had a closing ceremony where everyone joined together to share their testimonies and experiences, as well as few prayers.

Not only was this program successful, but it also helped students learn basic skills that are required in the modern world. It helped the students understand various perspectives, and gave us a glimpse of what we should or might expect when high school comes to an end. We were challenged to prioritize our goals for the future – a challenge to serve others – one we are eager to accept. We saw he needed medical attention and quickly went to call the nurses to bring their equipment across the parking lot to where he was sitting, along with some water and bananas. We were shocked to find him starting to smoke a cigarette when we returned and quickly replaced it with a banana in his hand. As the nurses took his blood pressure, we asked the elderly man if he knew Jesus. Tears streamed down his face as he heard for the first time of someone who loves him. We ended our visit with a prayer for him as well as a firm embrace. This is what it means to follow Jesus' footsteps.



welve teams from ten countries around the world flew to Erasmus University in Rotterdam, The Netherlands, from April 15-22, 2018 to compete for the prestigious RSM Star Case Competition 2018. Organized by the said university, this gathering of outstanding business undergraduate students is a unique opportunity for twelve teams from top business schools worldwide to compete with each other by presenting their solutions to real-life business cases. They were given 24 hours to solve a case about Coca-Cola's sustainability goals. Apiwat Narkhan, from EIS Class of 2015 and now a member of the Chulalongkorn University's Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) International Program, with his teammates were declared champions, while delegates from Australia and USA came in second and third place, respectively. Apiwat and his team brought home a team trophy and a 2,400 Euro cash award.

"Always seek to improve. If you sit idly and do nothing, you will never improve. So instead, find around 20 to 30 minutes each day to do something that contributes to your skills or your knowledge. These things may be: reading books, reading news, watching videos etc. Over time, it will turn into a good habit that gives you a good head start ahead of other people. Be passionate. Always give your 100% in all that you do. Regardless of the results, you will always be satisfied and gain many lessons from it. Lastly, never give up. There will be times when you are down and demotivated. Instead of giving up, you will need to quickly learn from it, make improvements, and overcome it," he conveyed through an online interview.

Weeks before the Star Case Competition in The Netherlands, Apiwat, and his team also won the HSBC Case Competition locally hosted by the Hongkong and Shanghai Bank Corporation open to all business college students in Thailand. The HSBC has awarded them with a 100,000 baht cash, individual certificates, and a team trophy. In that same competition, Apiwat was awarded the best speaker trophy. He and his team will be representing Thailand in the global round that will be held in Hong Kong in June 2018. They will be competing against 21 delegates from different countries.





ooking to the news, one can see that this world is increasing with sickness; this calls for a more urgent medical missionary work. The life of Christ reflects one of a medical missionary – a life that seeks to share the gospel by meeting the needs of the afflicted and healing the sick and suffering. All kinds of diseases and maladies cover this planet, and He wants to send out medical missionaries who will give the last message: a combination of the Third Angels' message and the health message.

Many Seventh-day Adventists adopt eight health laws which can be summarized with the acronym: NEWSTART, namely: **N**utrition, Exercise, **W**ater, **S**unlight, Temperance, **A**ir, **R**est, and Trust in God.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Global Health Department, the top 3 causes of death in Thailand include: cancer, ischemic heart disease, and stroke – which are all chronic diseases (1). Although it is true that one may have a genetic predisposition to these illnesses, with the right lifestyle choices they can easily be prevented.

Focusing on nutrition, an interesting review published in the journal Nutrients had the objective of analyzing and establishing the relationship between vegetarian diet interventions and chronic diseases, focusing on cardiovascular disease and cancer (2). The studies included in the review were based on three Adventist cohorts, and the results revealed that strict, pesco-, and lacto-ovo-vegetarian interventions were alarmingly significant at lowering risk for chronic diseases the board when compared non-vegetarians, thus increasing life-expectancy (2).



The participants of the studies were members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, many of which refrain from the use of tobacco and alcohol, and exhibit temperance in eating. Thus common confounders were easily controlled in these studies. At the end of the study researchers concluded that a behavioural change of adopting a vegetarian diet was proven to be a way to optimize one's health (2).

The Bethel Sanitarium, located in Gyeungsang Nam Do, South Korea, has been active for over 30 years in providing medical missionary evangelism and healthy eating program. The programs, The Maker Heals, has been held at the Thailand Adventist Mission in Bangkok, and at the Mission Health Promotion Center in Muak Lek, Saraburi, and countless testimonies can be told of the healing due to making simple lifestyle changes. The Maker Heals program is open to those who want to change their lifestyle or diet and learn how to cook healthy food, but also to share with family members and neighbors who are sick and desire a natural approach to healing.





The 10-day session will take place from July 6-15, 2018 at EIS with the registration fee of 3,000 baht which includes food and other expenses at the seminar. 
