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

Interview with Mrs. Beatrice Kootanasan, Principal for Student Administration

Tell us some of your personal and academic background.

I grew up in Malaysia and was married to a Thai. After completing high school, I went to the Southeast Asia Union College in Singapore for two years and completed my BS degree in Secretarial Science at the Adventist University of the Philippines. I received my Masters in Curriculum and Instruction from the Adventist Institute of Advance Studies, Philippines. I have worked for more than thirty years in several capacities, but my first love has been in teaching.

What are your responsibilites in the student administration.

Since I have been in this position for several years, I have been involved in many activities such as student discipline, organizing the school wide fun fair, Pathfinder Camporee, Alumni Home Coming, community services, and many student-related activities. Student related activities, such as Sports Day and Talent Show are two big events eagerly awaited by the whole student body. Tell us something about your career. For over 50 years I have been working as a teacher and a librarian, but my first love has always been as a librarian. I have worked in many libraries, from primary schools to universities, in the USA, Indonesia, the Philippines, Vietnam, Cambodia, and Thailand. I assisted in rebuilding and organizing their libraries, and setting up the system electronically.

Why do you love to work in libraries?

Library is a place of wisdom and I just love books and it gives me an opportunity to share this love with teachers and students. It makes me very happy when I can help someone find information that they are struggling to locate. I hope I can share this love to our students at EIS.

What resources are presently available at the EIS Library?

The library has an online card catalogue to find books and websites on most subjects. We also have EBSCO, an online academic researcher. The library is equipped with computers for students to do school work and research. There is also a computer classroom in the library in which teachers can conductlasses. Other services include printing, photocopying, scanning and laminating documents.

Tell us your plans for the library.

We have plans to set up the following:
Media Center where students can watch videos and listen to CDs.
Establish an area where students can do projects or do collaborative work.
Develop a listening center where students can listen to storytelling and follow along in a book in the elementary library.
Purchase more tables and chairs so that classes can come and learn library skills.

What have you accomplished so far?

 A young adult (YA) section in the high school library has been added.
 A regular story collection (SC) in each library has also been set up.

tion and have a special place for them.4. Weeding many old books and we are still doing it.

5. Re-arranged the furniture in the elementary library to make it more spacious.

We have a good collection of books and are working hard to make it even better. Teachers have been actively involved in choosing books that meet their curriculum needs.

Do you have any advice for our students?

Everyone needs to ask for help when they cannot find what they need. The library is the center and brains of this institution. Families are also encouraged to use the library using their children's ID number. The upper area in the high school library has been nicknamed "the loft." It has been set aside for a relaxed reading area.

Tell us about the Book Fair that you organized recently?

We started by inviting three vendors and ended up with seven vendors which made it possible for everyone, young and old to find a treasure to take home. Reading is so essential to learning; thus, it was so exciting to see students, parents and teachers so enthralled about getting books. It is also actually important for every child to have his or her own library. The library received generous discounts and many free books. Most of the vendors gave some discount to everyone. The next book fair will be in March 2009. Let us all look forward to that time. We will annouce the date later.

"Beyond Just Words"

 I' ive speakers, five videos and five life stories found their way into the first full five-day week of school this year during EIS's Week of Spiritual Emphasis. The theme of the week was "Beyond Just Words." The messages centered on the idea that when a person searches for God with all their heart, God will answer, regardless of their background.

"If you're a Buddhist, be a Buddhist. If you're a Hindu, be a Hindu," closed Pastor Roger Williams, head chaplain at EIS, on the last day of the week. "If you're Christian, be a Christian – whatever you are, live it."

"Christians, Buddhists, Sikhs, Muslims—we all say we believe in love and helping others, but how many of us actually do it?" Chaplain Howard asked grades four, five and six during the Elementary chapel on Friday. Chaplain Howard added, "If any of us lived what we claimed to believe, how much better would this world be."

Chaplain Renée Goff spoke on the power words that can have on people's selfesteem.

High school values teacher, Ms. Melissa Erbenich spoke to the high school and intermediate sections about the power of real belief in God's love for us. Ms. Melissa, who battled with low self-esteem most of her life, began to get into shape at the beginning of last school year, and as she did, she was forced to face the way God valued her versus the way she valued herself. Ms. Melissa said she is only now beginning to see herself "as God sees me."

High school English teacher and SC sponsor Ms Markie Bazzy spoke to the high school and intermediate sections about growing up with an undesirable father who eventually left her and finally died, and the effects this had on her view of God as a father. "God, I don't need anything else. I don't need anyone else, I just need You." Ms Markie prayed as she closed her talk. Students and teachers could be seen wiping away tears as Ms. Markie spoke.

English and reading teacher Ms. Maile Wikum spoke to the younger grades about the importance of not being a follower. She told a story about following friends and causing a boy to be very badly injured because she did something she knew was wrong.

The response from students on the Week of Spiritual Emphasis varied, some wanting more skits and plays, but many said they enjoyed the variety of speakers and the program because of the personal touch and the use of video.

AP Program

Ekamai International School is offering AP program. AP or Advanced Placement program is designed for students to take university-level courses and exams to earn university credit while in high school.

Importance

1. AP can change a student's life through college-level AP courses.

- 2. He/she can enter a universe of knowledge that might otherwise remain
- unexplored in high school.

3. One acquires the opportunity to earn credit or advanced standing at most colleges and universities.

Scoring

The scoring is on a 1-5 scale, with 1 as the lowest, 5 the highest, and 3 as the passing grade. A person who meets the AP scoring requirements in an AP-participating university will gain credit for the subject that he/she had taken.

Who should take AP classes?

1. Those who are planning to further their education abroad, particularly in the U.S.A.

2. Students who are highly self-motivated and well-disciplined in their studies.

Traffic flow at the front gate area especially in the mornings may not be smooth





English Language Program

EIS has been trying to encourage students to speak English consistently while in School. Beginning this school year, Ekamai International School finally formulated a system called "English Speaking Program (ESP)."

Objectives

The system authorizes teachers to give a one point deduction ticket to those who speak languages other than English. The deduction of points is only for those who dampen down the ESP by speaking other languages. By deductions, students are reminded that there is a consequence for not supporting the ESP of speaking English only. Thus the ESP hopes to achieve the challenging task of inspiring all on campus to speak English because, according to the ESP slogan, "Speaking English in School is super cool." What happens to the final scores? At the end of each quarter, the scores of all students who have received a deduction will be forwarded to all of their subject and homeroom teachers. Deductions will affect 10% of the students' English and Values grades and 5% of grades in all other subjects except Thai and foreign languages—Japanese, Chinese and Spanish.

The Importance of Speaking English

Studies have shown that students with an acquisition of a second language have a greater mental capacity and also do much better in their scholastic work. One of the best ways to pick up fluency in a language is to speak it as often as possible. Therefore fluency in speaking

English is best through interaction and exposure, and this is the aim of the ESP. Ultimately, not only are we positively inspiring the students to speak English while at school, but also encouraging them to take active part in all activities outside of school.

IOWA Testing Program

TBS (Iowa Testing of Basic Skills) is usually conducted in January each year, administered to all students from grade 3 - 8. The test is an indication of students' performance at that point of time. The results from this test give insight into the relative strength and weakness of students in specific subject areas. The students are tested in six areas of learning: reading skills, language skills, math, social studies, science, and processing sources of information.

Advantages

 The ITBS results allow teachers and school administration to make appropriate adjustment to the curriculum to maximize student achievement.
 It assists in describing a student's developmental level in a particular area.
 It creates a mean to monitor student progress over time.

Brief Description of the Tests: Vocabulary

The Vocabulary test measures listening vocabulary.

Word Analysis

The questions on the Word Analysis test assess how well students can recognize letters and letter-sound relationships.

Reading Comprehension

The Reading test presents students with a variety of tasks, which progressively require more independence in reading as the test level increases.

Listening

The test measures students' abilities to follow directions, understand sequences, and predict outcomes.

Language

The Language tests of Levels 5 and 6 measure students' abilities to understand linguistic relationships -- how language is used to express ideas. For Levels 7 and 8, a major portion of the test deals with skills in spelling, capitalization, punctuation, and skills in usage and expression in writing

Mathematics

The Mathematics test measures begin-

ning math concepts, problem solving, and math operations.

Social Studies


Only the Levels 7 and 8 batteries contain a Social Studies test. All questions are presented orally in the areas of geography, history, government, economics, sociology, and the other social sciences.

Science

The Science test is included in only the Levels 7 and 8 batteries. The knowledge and skills measured by the Science test questions come from the areas of life science, earth and space sciences, and physical sciences.

Sources of Information

Only the Levels 7 and 8 batteries contain a Sources of Information test. The main skills measured are alphabetizing, using a picture dictionary, using a table of contents, and using maps to determine location, direction, and distance.



The chart above shows the performance of students in January 2008 showing that at all levels, EIS students have attained the required level to be in that particular grade. As an example, grade 3 students are expected to reach the level of 3. The above chart shows that they have attained a level of 3.9.

Thai Culture Classes

h or the past two summers, the EIS has been offering a course on Thai Culture. Last summer the course attracted 90 students from Grade 10 and 11. To make it an authentic experience, all students had to dress in traditional Thai costume.

Goals and objectives

Ekamai International School is unique. While English is used as a medium of instruction in regular classes, the student body is about 80% Thai. Recongnizing this fact, EIS wanted its students to understand and practice Thai culture. Doing so will enable our students to be assimilated better into Thai society after they leave EIS.

Activities

All students were taught Thai manners, Thai history, Thai wisdom, Thai cuisine, Thai dance and Thai handicrafts. By the end of the course, students werecooking Thai food, and performing traditional dances. They also conducted food sales, planted orchids plants and went for a field trip to Ayuthya. Students and parents have shown in many ways that they appreciated the importance EIS has placed on Thai Culture.
