Importance of Mathematics

From the desk of the Principal for Middle School

Dear Students, Parents, and Friends:

Importance of mathematics for a future career

Many of us know about the advantages of mathematics in our day to day life. Mathematics is all around us such as when we count money or when we go shopping. Mathematics provides tools to the common men to understand the world and how they can change it. These tools include skills required for problem solving, logical reasoning, and the ability to think in various ways.

Why Study Mathematics?

Most of university degrees require mathematics. They are required in all faculties in the universities and we need to prepare our students to handle the challenging math that will be required in their studies later on.

Students who choose not to take mathematics seriously or to ignore it in high school forfeit many future career opportunities that they could have. They essentially turn their backs on more than half the job market. The importance of mathematics for potential careers cannot be over emphasized.

Curriculum Changes in EIS

Curriculum changes have been made at EIS in order to bring the teaching of math to an advance level. Students are encouraged to take the study of mathematics seriously from the lower grades on up. Grade 6 students are required to fulfill four criteria in order to be able to take Algebra 1 in Grade 7 and later, Geometry in Grade 8. The total score for the criteria should not be less than 42 for Algebra and 45 for Geometry with a minimum grade of C- in the math classes attended. Provisions has been in placed to assist students who are not mathematically inclined. They can take High School math instead, which is a simplified math that will enable them to graduate from EIS later on.

I want to urge all students to study mathematics seriously as it will provide a solid foundation to many aspects not only in our studies but also in our daily life."
