
Not only does it prepare students for their university life, but it also serves as the best time for students to decide upon the kind of career they want to pursue in the future.











Dr. Nick Walters, a medical doctor from Bangkok Adventist Hospital conducted the life support training that covered first-aid, cardio pulmonary resuscitation for both adults and children, and how to respond to emergency situations. The lecture and hands-on training were beneficial and purposeful as teachers are the frontliners in the classroom setting.

Simultaneously, some staff composed of campus supervisors, security guards, nurses, cafeteria and snack bar staff, and other teacher assistants and teachers attended the health training workshop conducted by Cdr. Napat Meesomperm, RTN., Surgical Office Chief Medical Officer of Somdech Phra Pinklao Hospital. Participants engaged into actual first-aid treatments, self-defense, and other life protection and preservation exercises.

"It was interesting to learn something practical and and important in cases of emergencies. When we cannot seek help elsewhere, we need to know the basics of life preservation. God has gifted us with



AP ACHIEVERS AND PASSERS



In the late spring 2018, there were many students who partook in the AP exams such as: Macroeconomics or Microeconomics, English Language and Composition, Chemistry, Calculus BC, and Biology. The results were exceptional with the scores of 5, 4, and 3. AP exams are advanced placement exams of courses that some students might excel at better than the normal course. AP classes or exams are college-level curriculums, and if you have confidence and faith in yourself, then I say: take the risk.

In some universities, if you have taken AP classes and received an outstanding score on the exam, then you are not required to take that subject anymore, and instead, you are allowed to take more advanced classes. AP exams are assigned by Collegeboard to test your level of thinking, check where you stand in that particular subject, and give feedback on what you might need to improve on.

"The practice tests that Ma'am Shireen assigned us from time to time in class really helped with preparing myself for the English AP exam. Before exam day I also took the afternoon off to relax for a bit (instead of cramming in as many practices as I could) because I think it helps me clear my head." — Janine Charoonruk 12C.

"To master an AP exam, all you need to do is to analyse the past test and find out what the test makers want to see from you. For both the AP Calculus BC and Physics 2 exams, I reviewed the past papers in class and made sure everything was clear. 





THE MAKER HEALS FAST

A NATURAL HEALING SEMINAR

survived a 10-day fast – but it's not what you're thinking.

"I love food," confessed one of the attendees, who went to a buffet the evening before the 10-day session started. Ms. Lin bore all when she said, "I cheated," at the culmination of the seminar. A friend gave her a vegan brownie, and since it was almost lunchtime she had 2 bites – only to suffer form an upset stomach just moments later. Quickly she went to the toilet, and prayed really hard. "I was asking God for forgiveness. I know I was overcoming and winning [in the battle against] self-indulgence, but because of the cheat, I suffered immediately and instantly." The principle of fasting is not simply refraining from eating for a period of time, it is not to lose weight, and it is not just to remove waste and toxins from the body so the body can restore itself. Fasting is having true repentance and denying self.

The path of self-denial is the path to health (1). – Ellen G. White, health reformer

Intemperate eating is often the cause of sickness (1). And what does intemperate eating entail? Consuming the wrong types of food, with the wrong portion sizes, and at the wrong time of day. We crave, we indulge, we fall ill and contract diseases. If we harness and control what we consume, then we can live healthy lives.

High fat diets lead to oxidative stress (2) and contribute to cardiovascular disease and cancer to name a few. To minimize oxidative damage in the body it is recommended to: exercise; consume a good amount of fruits and vegetables; eat fish periodically; and avoid red meat, smoking, and consuming alcohol (2).

Michael Pollan, New York Times bestseller author and food activist summarizes what to eat in 7 simple words: Eat food, not to much, mostly plants.





Water is the main constituent of the human body's cells, tissues, and organs; thus, water is vital for life (3). Water transports nutrients to cells and removes wastes from cells (3). Although we may not be high-performance athletes, a good hydration level



is required for the body to function optimally (3). Drinking water helps enlarge blood vessels, and eliminates wastes from the body (3), such that the body can restore itself.

The Maker Heals 10-day natural healing seminar took place from July 6 to 15, 2018 at Ekamai International School, and many attendees joined







to learn how to make lifestyle changes, and share healthy eating principles with family members and neighbours who may be sick and desire a natural approach to healing.

classroom of care is a place where "a group of students engage in intellectual discussions, have the freedom to express themselves respectfully and build positive relationships with teachers and fellow students," paraphrased from Sue Bredekamp (2014). This is a classroom, where active learning happens and this signifies security and a guarantee that they will be challenged. This is the class where students beat down the door to get in and stay in. There are clear rules and active participation and flexibility towards the upcoming radical ideas but with research to back it up.

Bredekamp (2014) specifies rules which encompass foundations of а caring 1. Educators take care of students by having positive relationships with people in the class. Educators take care of each student by encouraging a positive building up of each person. 3. Educators take care of the school as they plan intensive intellectually stimulating intervention programs.

The teacher must never forget that the student is there to learn and then practice. The teachers should make sure that the class is well balanced in all teachings methodologies.

Too much of any one strategy is not a balance, to quoted Bredekamp (2014), who specifies a four part progress of a caring classroom.

However, when these boundaries are pushed and the rules are broken, then it is not a "mistake never to be forgotten," but rather as "misbehavior and pushing of the boundaries to be acknowledged and dealt to understand the reasoning (Gartrell 2011). When teachers deals with behavior and separates it from the mistake, condemnation and labelling then it becomes a caring classroom (Bredekamp 2014; Fox, Dunlap, Hemmeter, Joseph, and Strain 0 3 When children feel accepted completely irrespective of their behavior and are told

how to rectify it they feel safe (Bredekamp (2014) states that a student must be given ample amount of time to research, express, and share - if not discuss the topic and its A caring teacher finds a balance relevance. between the individual and the group. The individual is, however, not allowed to overpower, intimidate, bully or depreciate the value of another in the group. The group is where they learn from each other as equals (Vygotsky, 1978). It is imperative that the teacher creates a balance between being impartial fair and yet encourages intellectual stimulation of the mind with practical advice and proper teaching techniques.


for avenues where he can best convey his thoughts and ideas.




